# Just Ask! **Discussion Questions**



#### **Before Reading:**

- What do you think the title means?
- Why do you think there are different flowers on the cover? How do you think this relates to the title?
- Look at the back of this book. Does it give you more information about what it may be about? How so?
- The text at the bottom says, "Be different, be brave, be you." What do you think that means?

### While Reading:

- After reading the first two pages, describe how kids and flowers are similar. What does the author mean by, "Each of us grows in our own way"?
- After reading the page that features Rafael, discuss the two tools the book has • mentioned. What other tools can people use to help them?
- After reading about Madison and Artura, describe how you use your senses. •
- How are Jordan and Tiana similar? How are they different? •
- Nolan is allergic to nuts. How can Nolan's classmates keep him safe at school? • How can we keep our classmates safe? Ex. Don't share food. Wash hands after eating.

#### After Reading:

- What would the world be like if everyone was the same? Reread the analogy on the last page if needed.
- Why is it important to *just ask*?
- Which part(s) of the Novel Effect soundscape helped you understand differences in the book?
- What type of plant do you think you are similar to? How so?
- What different tools did characters in the story use? Were any of these tools new to • you?
- Vijay used sign language. How is language used as a tool?
- Do you relate to any of the differences mentioned in the story? If you're • comfortable, share how you relate.
- What questions do you have about the book?
- Answer Sonia Sotomayor's question at the end of the book. What will you do with your superpower?

# Just Ask! Discussion Questions



#### **Before Reading:**

- Who is the author? What you know about her?
- How do you think the title and cover illustrations are related?
- What does the text at the bottom of the cover make you think this book will be about?
- This book is about differences. Describe a difference you're comfortable sharing about.

#### While Reading:

- After reading the first two pages, describe how the author compares kids to flowers. What else could you compare kids to?
- Make a connection between the character giving herself insulin and the part of the flower she is sitting in, as well as the bees surrounding her. *Hint: They all relate to sugar.*
- After reading about Madison and Artura, describe how you use your senses similarly. How do you use your senses differently?
- What can you infer about autism based on the similarities and/or differences Jordan and Tiana have?

#### After Reading:

- How did the Novel Effect soundscape help convey feelings in the story? Use a specific example.
- Determine the story's central message.
- Define *inclusivity*. How does it relate to this book?
- Describe analogies you noticed in the book.
- What was the tone of the story? How so?
- Compare yourself to a type of plant. Explain the comparison.
- Which two tools from the story do you think are most similar? How so?
- Can you think of any tools that were not mentioned in the book?
- Everybody uses tools in life. What do you use?
- Why do you think Sonia Sotomayor wrote this book?
- Using classroom materials or your body, create a sound effect that embodies you.
- Interpret the book's title now that you've read it. Explain its meaning.

# *Just Ask!* Writing Prompts

- 1-3
- Write about characteristics that make you unique.
- How are people like flowers in a garden?
- Write about tools you use everyday. What do those tools help you do?
- Write about something you are really good at. What tools do you use for this? *Ex. senses, imagination, paint brush, soccer ball, glasses muscles, etc.*
- If you were a plant, what kind would you be? Why?
- Answer Sonia Sotomayor's question at the end of the book, "what will you do with your powers?"
- Which child in the book is most like you? Write about how you are similar and different.
- Write about the lesson this story teaches.
- Write about a time you experienced feeling different.

- Write another page for this book that includes a difference that was not mentioned.
- Which character did you relate to the most?
  Use evidence from the book to explain your thinking.
- Compare and contrast yourself and a character from the book.
- Write a book recommendation. Who would you recommend this book to? Why?
- Write about one the differences from this book. Imagine you are explaining it to someone who is unfamiliar with the condition.
- Write a list of questions you would like to ask characters from the book. Make sure to word the questions compassionately.

# **No Print Novelties**

Use these no print activities at school or home.

## Swap Meet:

Use this movement activity to continue discussions about the book.

- Students find a partner.
- Teacher shares one of the prompts:
  - What tools were mentioned in the book?
  - What tools do you use?
  - Recall some differences mentioned in the story.
  - How did this story make you feel? Why?
  - What did you learn from listening to the story?
  - What does the title, Just Ask, mean?
  - What are some ways we can be inclusive?
  - How can we be empathetic towards others?
  - Would you recommend Just Ask to someone else? Why?

Optional: Students find a new partner for each prompt to gain varying perspectives.

### **Home Challenges**

**Option 1:** Use the experiences in the book to talk with your learner about the differences between empathy, being kind, and being nice. Discuss feelings and questions that may arise when we encounter people with visible and invisible differences, and how we can use our powers to be empathetic.

**Option 2:** Use the sign language poster in this packet. Practice signing words or names together.
